Journal of Boredom Studies

The Journal of Boredom Studies has been launched!

The international peer-reviewed [Journal of Boredom Studies \(JBS\)](#), published annually by the International Society of Boredom Studies, is a multidisciplinary and open-access forum for theoretical and empirical advancements in all areas of boredom studies, including, but not limited to, Animal Studies, Anthropology, Architecture, Cultural Studies, Education, History, Literary Studies, Management, Philosophy, Political Studies, Psychology, and Sociology. It covers topics referring to boredom (and related states like melancholy, ennui, tedium, etc.), that deal with its conceptualizations, cultural and societal representations, perceptions, forms, functions, characteristics, causes/correlates, and consequences/outcomes. It aims to promote and disseminate multidisciplinary research on boredom, facilitate the advancement of knowledge concerning boredom, and give visibility and access to scientific and scholarly papers on boredom.

The journal publishes (1) theoretical, and empirical **papers**, (2) **reviews** of books related to boredom, and (3) English **translations** (max. 2 per issue) of papers and chapters on boredom published initially in vernacular languages. The publication of articles in JBS is **steady/continual**. The only language accepted is **English**. Contributions are published as soon as they successfully go through peer-review and editing. Each issue is open in January and closed in mid-December. Publication frequency is **one issue per year**. There is no charge to authors for publication in JBS. The journal is published based on **open access policy**. Articles in the Journal of Boredom Studies are available under a license [Attribution-NonCommercial 4.0 International \(CC BY-NC 4.0\)](#).

[The International Society of Boredom Studies](#) is pleased to invite researchers and faculty staff from all disciplines to participate with papers in the **5th International Interdisciplinary Boredom Conference**. Following the successful launch and development of the cross-disciplinary Boredom Studies, and in accordance with previous editions, the Conference aims to attract specialists on boredom from a wide range of disciplines to expand the knowledge we have already achieved concerning its nature, history, causes, and consequences. The goals of this encounter are to 1) gather together boredom researchers from various academic disciplines worldwide; 2) make new and develop existing connections between them; 3) create the venue for interdisciplinary boredom-oriented academic discussion; 4) promote Boredom Studies as a justified, significant, and needed domain of scientific research; and 5) establish recurrent organizational and social structures that enable further development of Boredom Studies.

We look forward to proposals addressing the following **areas of interest**:

- Philosophy, Theology and History of Boredom
- Psychology and Psychiatry of Boredom
- Anthropology and Sociology of Boredom
- Boredom in Culture (Literature, Art, etc.)
- Boredom in Education and Pedagogy

We would like to encourage the contributions outside above list as we plan to organize an **open session**.

Please, send **proposals** (in English) of no more than 500 words using the [registration form](#) no later than **January 31, 2023**. Those selected will be notified on 12 February 2021. The participation in the Conference is **free of charge**. The Conference will be held **online** and all presentations will be recorded. The language of the Conference is **English only**. The proceedings of the Conference will be published as an issue of [Journal of Boredom Studies](#).
