Awards

We are pleased to inform you that our members Wijnand van Tilburg and Katy Tam won IG Nobel Award! Tam won IG Nobel Award!

Wijnand van Tilburg and Katy Tam won an Ig Nobel Award for their part in an international study into the boredom of teachers and students. The study "Boredom Begets Boredom" concluded that students or teachers expecting a lecture or class to be boring can actually make it even more boring for them.

The study was conducted by Van Tilburg and researchers from China, Canada, the United Kingdom, Ireland, Japan, and the United States. They studied undergraduate students' expectations of boredom and experienced boredom in three studies. The <u>results</u> indicated that "the mere expectation that a lecture will be boring may be sufficient to exacerbate its subsequent occurrence."

The Ig Nobel Awards are awarded every year to scientific studies that make you laugh but also make you think. These involve real, scientific research into topics that may seem silly but have an actual impact on society. The boredom study won in the Education category.
