The first was *Boredom and Modernity* by Elizabeth Goodstein (Stanford University Press), and the second was the English translation of Lars Svendsen's *The Philosophy of Boredom* (Reaktion Books). With this in mind, we invite authors to reflect on the **history and development of boredom studies**. In particular, we look forward to proposals addressing different areas of interest you can find on the website. Please, remember that submissions are expected to be received via the <u>journal's website</u> by **April 30**, 2025. Articles of 5,000-10,000 words should be prepared, considering the journal's <u>author quidelines</u>.
