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"Bored and dead and dull": Ernest Hemingway's existential boredom in *The Sun Also Ri*ses

Days as an expatriate in Paris and the trip to Spain for San Fermín inspire Ernest Hemingway to verbalize his memories into a novel. Hemingway, an Illinoisan writer whose roman à clef— The Sun Also Rises, brings out the moral decay and the disillusion thereupon, found in what Gertrude Stein coins the "Lost Generation". Hemingway, who portrays hedonism and alcoholism in The Sun Also Rises, resembled the essence of boredom, specifically existential boredom. Although much has been discussed about Hemingway's The Sun Also Rises, the lens through boredom is however absent. This thesis therefore analyzes the motif of existential boredom, as it shows in Hemingway's The Sun Also Rises, through the interpretations of existential boredom by the Norwegian philosopher, Lars Svendsen. This thesis argues that Hemingway's characters in The Sun Also Rises undergo the state of being bored, resonating Svendsen's ideas on the existential boredom, as the constant drinking and socializing are ways to address the vacuity.
